Remarks

The distribution of barometric pressure over Europe yesterday was ^{of a} rather unusual ^{character.} It was high (about 30.30 inches) ^{near} ~~about~~ the entrance of the Channel and over the Bay of Biscay, about four tenths lower ^{both} to the northward over Scotland and to the southward over southern Spain and the Mediterranean, and about eight tenths lower (or 29.50 inches) to the eastward over Russia. In Spain the weather was fine, with fresh northeasterly winds; ^{Italy and} in the Adriatic ~~and~~ unsettled, with varying winds, and in the Baltic stormy from south and southwest.
