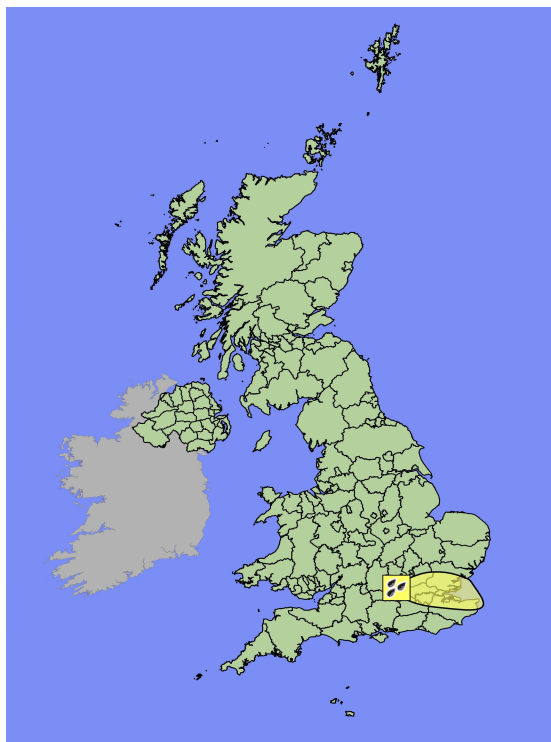




National Severe Weather Warning Service



Chief Forecasters Assessment

The build of heat at low levels coupled with the development of localised convergence zones is likely to generate optimum conditions for development of intense thunderstorms, with potential for 15-25mm of rain in an hour. However, as is often the case, the situation is finely balanced and there is some uncertainty with regard to the intensity and distribution of showers, with many places within the the warning area staying dry.

The Met Office have issued a **Yellow Warning of Rain**

Valid from **15:00 on Tue, 29th May 2012** until **03:00 on Wed, 30th May 2012**

Isolated slow moving thunderstorms with potential for torrential downpours are again likely to develop late afternoon and evening and only slowly dissipate during the early part of tonight. The public should be aware of the risk of local flash flooding, especially in urban areas.
