0600 GMT 02 APRIL 2010 SIG WEATHER	1200 GMT 02 APRIL 2010 SIG WEATHER	<p><b>Summary of UK Weather for Friday 02 April 2010.</b>                      Apart from a few showers in northern Scotland, most of Scotland, Northern Ireland and northern England had a dry and clear night with a frost.</p> <p>The rest of England and Wales stayed generally cloudy with some showery rain, more especially over southern counties.</p> <p>A frontal band of quite heavy rain moved into Cornwall by the end of the night. This band of rain moved steadily north-eastwards across Wales and England, to reach Northern Ireland, Yorkshire and Lancashire by the end of the afternoon, then into Northumberland and the Borders during the evening. ## Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 03 April 2010.

During the night much of Scotland and Northern Ireland was cloudy with further rain at times, along with sleet and snow on higher ground, although north-western Scotland was cold and mainly dry.

England and Wales had scattered showers, some heavy.

Most places remained frost-free overnight, although there was a frost across north-western Scotland, and elsewhere there was a patchy ground frost.


During the day many areas of England and Wales had some sunshine, especially coastal parts of north-western England and south-eastern England.

There were also plenty of heavy showers, a few containing hail and thunder, and there was also some sleet and snow on the hills.

Later in the day many southern coastal counties experienced some more prolonged heavy rain, which became slow moving across Dorset and Hampshire during the evening.

Across Scotland and Northern Ireland it remained generally cloudy, and there were further outbreaks of rain, with sleet and snow on the higher ground.

Temperatures were near or slightly below average for early April, and fell quite markedly in the heavier showers.

## Summary of UK Weather for Tuesday 06 April 2010.


A cold front brought prolonged rain to Northern Ireland and western Scotland, while much of England enjoyed hazy sunshine and warm temperatures.

The rain band edged slowly eastwards, lasting in Northern Ireland until early afternoon, and continuing in western Scotland until the evening. Eastern Scotland received rain from daybreak and here it lasted until past sunset. The western coast of Wales, Cornwall, and Cumbria were also wet from noon onwards.

Elsewhere the weather was considerably drier and brighter, with eastern Wales and the rest of England enjoying hazy sunshine under a veil of high cloud.

Northern Ireland briefly enjoyed brighter weather until mid-afternoon, when sharp showers moved in from the west coast. Some of these showers produced isolated thunderstorms.

England, Wales, and Scotland were all subject to a brisk and gusty south-westerly wind. Northern Ireland, in contrast, enjoyed only light southerly winds after the rain. Those parts of England and Wales that escaped the rain were warm for the time of year. Northern Ireland achieved only average temperatures, while Scotland was rather cold as a result of the rain.

## Summary of UK Weather for Sunday 11 April 2010.


A chilly start for many parts again, with temperatures below freezing in sheltered parts of Scotland, and just above freezing elsewhere.

England, Wales and southern Scotland were fairly cloudy at first with extensive higher cloud making early sunshine hazy, and low cloud affecting south-eastern coasts.

During the day, much of the U.K. remained dry and largely sunny, but still hazy at times with the high cloud. The low cloud in the south-east broke up for a time, allowing some sunshine here too, although the low cloud returned during the late afternoon. It also became rather breezy in southern England during the afternoon, and also quite windy in the Channel Islands throughout the day.

It was a dry and fine end to the day for most, with the low cloud in the east steadily spreading westwards across central and southern England.

Temperatures rose above the seasonal average in most places during the afternoon, with the warmest maximum temperatures recorded in Northern Ireland and western Scotland.

## Summary of UK Weather for Monday 12 April 2010.


An area of high pressure centred over the North Atlantic ocean brought generally fine and dry conditions to most parts of the U.K., with the warmest weather to be found in Northern Ireland and south-western Scotland.

Many parts of England and Wales were relatively cloudy at first, but during the morning and afternoon much of the cloud melted away, and there were extended sunny periods in most places, but also one or two scattered showers in the south-east.

Fresh to strong north-easterly winds continued across parts of central and southern England, making it feel cool in places, especially around eastern coasts.

Scotland and Northern Ireland had a much sunnier start to the day, with only a little high cloud making the sun hazy in places. It remained sunny in most parts, although during the afternoon cloud began to spread into northern Scotland, bringing isolated outbreaks of drizzle and light rain to some places by the end of the day.

Temperatures were well above average for the time of year in south-western Scotland and across most of Northern Ireland.

Some cloud breaks occurred across northern England, western Scotland and Northern Ireland, leading to a cold night in Scotland, with a frost across the Highlands.                      During the day, the south of England was generally cloudy with isolated outbreaks of light rain during the morning. This cloud persisted in places for much of the day, though mostly cleared by the evening.                      In many other areas the cloud broke up to allow some sunny spells, although low cloud continued along some eastern coasts of Scotland and England, and started to encroach further inland again through the evening.                      Brisk north-easterly winds affected south-eastern England particularly; elsewhere, winds were generally fairly light.                      Maximum temperatures were mostly around average for the time of year, but slightly below in some eastern coastal areas.</p>

0600 GMT 15 APRIL 2010 SIG WEATHER	1200 GMT 15 APRIL 2010 SIG WEATHER	<p><b>Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 15 April 2010.</b>                      This was a dry day across the U.K., with variable amounts of cloud.</p> <p>At dawn cloud was most widespread across eastern and northern parts, but spread south and west through the morning, with large areas of central England and Scotland under cloud by midday.</p> <p>The best of the early unshine, therefore, was across south-west England, Wales and Northern Ireland.</p> <p>Cloud generally dispersed through the day, although it persisted throughout across parts of north-eastern England and northern Scotland.</p> <p>The ash plume from the eruption of Eyjafjallajokull spread towards the U.K. during the day, and was observed at Lerwick in Shetland around mid-afternoon, with dust and odours being detected by people in the Northern Isles.</p> <p>Temperatures were mostly around average for the time of year, but somewhat below in eastern England where the cloud persisted, with the temperature not rising above single figures in some areas.</p>




## Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 17 April 2010.

There was a cold start with fog developing in south-east England, with a widespread ground frost in Northern Ireland and northern England southwards, with a local air frost in many rural parts.

		<p>Outbreaks of rain continued to affect parts of northern England and Scotland during the early hours, with some sleet and snow over the higher hills in central Scotland. These were also reported at lower levels for a time after dawn. It was also cold in the north with a widespread frost under clear skies. Meanwhile further south it remained dry, and became cold in the south-west with a slight ground frost.</p> <p>During the course of the day, the showery rain continued in the northern and central parts of England and west Wales, whilst becoming drier and brighter along western coasts.</p> <p>A few scattered showers also developed later in south-east England as afternoon temperatures rose.</p> <p>It remained driest, brightest and warmest through the day in south-west England.</p>



## Summary of UK Weather for Tuesday 20 April 2010.

During the early hours, heavy showers continued to spread southwards across Scotland, falling as snow on higher ground. Apart from a few light showers across parts of Northern Ireland and northern England, it was largely dry and clear elsewhere, with a widespread ground frost by morning.


For much of England, Wales and Northern Ireland, it was dry and fine throughout the morning and afternoon, albeit rather breezy.

In contrast, it was more unsettled and wintry across the bulk of Scotland, with a mix of sunshine and showers. The showers were particularly heavy and frequent across northern and central Scotland, where they fell as either sleet, snow or hail.

The north-westerly wind was also stronger over Scotland throughout the day, with gales (gusts 45-50 knots) in exposed parts.

Wintry showers continued to affect northern and eastern Scotland, but also north-east England during the evening. Elsewhere across the U.K., it remained fine and dry for the evening.

Maximum temperatures were generally below average across much of the U.K., although near average in the south and south-east of England.


## Summary of UK Weather for Friday 23 April 2010.

A cold but bright start for much of England and Wales, and also parts of Northern Ireland, with widespread frost, although medium-level cloud in northern England helped to prevent some frost here. It was also cold further north in Scotland, with a band of rain and sleet that moved in from the west during the early hours of the morning, occasionally turning to snow over the higher ground.

The fine and largely sunny day then continued for most of England and Wales, with a little more cloud in northern England and Northern Ireland.

In Scotland, the rain persisted for most of the day, sometimes falling as sleet or snow on higher ground. The main rain band stayed south of the Northern Isles, however, these seeing instead a mixture of wintry showers, with snow occasionally falling down to relatively low levels.

Maximum temperatures were rather warm for the time of year across southern parts but, conversely, close to or rather below average in Scotland, due to the band of precipitation persisting throughout the day.

## Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 24 April 2010.

It was a cold night for England and Wales with widespread ground frost and local air frost, along with some mist or fog patches under clearer skies. It was also cold in Scotland underneath cloud and persistent rain along with hill snow at first.


Northern Ireland remained mostly dry, with temperatures remaining above freezing.

Mist and fog cleared quickly during the first part of the morning over England, leaving hazy sunny spells. Cloud and rain also moved away from Scotland to the north-east during the day, leading to brighter and warmer conditions.

Thicker cloud moved in from the west during the day, affecting Northern Ireland, and also western coasts of England and Wales by the end of the afternoon with some light rain in places.

During the evening, rain continued to move away from northern Scotland, but further showery outbreaks spread eastwards into some western areas. Under thickening cloud, it was a much warmer evening than recently.

Despite the haziness of the sun, it was a very warm day with the highest temperatures in the London area.

A band of rain spread eastwards across the U.K. overnight and during the morning, gradually clearing eastern coasts by midday.                      Following behind this was a scattering of showers. These turned heavy in places, particularly across Northern Ireland, and southern and eastern England, with some locally large rainfall totals and a few isolated rumbles of thunder.                      In Scotland, outbreaks of light rain affected western parts for much of the day, with generally drier conditions persisting across many eastern areas. 
## Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 28 April 2010.

Some occasionally heavy rain spread into Scotland, Northern Ireland and parts of northern England overnight, but it remained largely dry further south-east, and it was a mild night for most.

After dawn, most of the U.K. was mainly dry with the exception of some showers for the extreme north-west. It was also fairly bright, especially in the south and east of England, the Channel Islands and Aberdeenshire. However, despite the brightness there was plenty of high cloud around, occasionally thick enough to give the odd spot of light rain at times during the afternoon over parts of Wales and East Anglia. The Shetland Isles remained largely cloudy, but fairly dry and mild throughout the day.

Further cloud and some light rain began to gather in the south-west during the evening.

The breaks in the high cloud, combined with the milder conditions, allowed temperatures to be above normal across most of the U.K. In the south and east of England, temperatures made it into the low twenties, making it the warmest day of the year so far.

## Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 29 April 2010.

It was a mainly dry and relatively mild night for most, with mainly light showers affecting western Scotland.

The day began with a good deal of low cloud, mist and fog around south-western coastal areas.


Elsewhere it was drier and brighter, but with scattered showers continuing in the north-west.

As the day progressed, occasionally heavy rain spread into much of England and Wales from the south-west, with a relatively cool and wet day here. The rain reached as far north as the Lake District and Teeside by late afternoon. Some south-eastern areas stayed dry for much of the day until being affected by sharp showers later in the afternoon.

Meanwhile, the brighter and showery conditions continued across Scotland and Northern Ireland for most of the day.

The rain began to clear eastwards during the evening, with further showers coming into north-western parts.

It was a warmer than average day for much of eastern England, with temperatures around normal for Scotland and Northern Ireland, and a little below average for western England and Wales under the cloud and rain.

## Summary of UK Weather for Friday 30 April 2010.


It was a dry night for many places, although light rain lingered until near dawn in the east of England, and showers continued in north-west Scotland. These showers gradually spread to Northern Ireland and parts of north-west England and Wales.

After dawn, sunshine and showers continued across the north and west, becoming more frequent and widespread during the morning.

In England and Wales, showers also developed widely, with a more organised cluster moving across first Wales, and then England in the afternoon. Many of these showers were heavy, and occasional thunder and lightning occurred widely across the country from midday onwards.

During the evening, Northern Ireland became largely dry, and showers became generally less frequent elsewhere. Thicker cloud and outbreaks of mostly light rain spread to northern Scotland during the late afternoon and early evening.

Maximum temperatures were mainly close to the average for the time of year, but a little below average in places, particularly Northern Ireland.
