Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 01 June 2005.

There were initially some clear spells across the east of the UK, allowing a little patchy mist to develop, as well as a touch of ground frost further north. However, cloud already into the west soon spread east, covering most parts by the morning. This cloud brought outbreaks of rain to many western areas, with some heavier bursts, especially in the northwest. Sea fog developed widely in the far southwest.

During the day, apart from some morning sunshine in the southeast, it continued to be cloudy with further outbreaks of rain, heavy at times. Through the course of the afternoon, the rain began to clear away east, leaving damp and drizzly conditions behind. Mist affected many coastal areas.

The evening remained cloudy with patchy outbreaks of mostly light rain or drizzle. Sea fog became a feature on the east coast of Scotland.

Winds were gentle to moderate for most, but were fresh and gusty at times in the far north.

Temperatures were generally around average, but were rather cool along western and southern coasts, as well as across eastern Scotland.

Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 02 June 2005.

A mostly cloudy and rather misty night across the UK, with some quite heavy pulses of rain spreading into many western areas, mainly north Wales northwards. Exposed coastal parts, as well as some hilltops, were affected by fog and drizzle. During the day the rain spread east across much of the UK, although the southeast of England remained largely dry. The southeast also saw some of the brightest weather, with hazy spells of sunshine developing through the afternoon. This helped temperatures to climb to a humid feeling 20 °C or 21 °C. The evening saw further spells of brightness in the southeast as well as parts of northern England. Elsewhere remained cloudy, with more rain across Scotland and Northern Ireland. Misty conditions in the southwest and across the east coast of Scotland produced some drizzly rain.

It was quite a breezy day across exposed western parts, as well as the far north of Scotland. Temperatures were generally near or a little above average, although the Northern Isles and parts of the southwest were rather cool.

Summary of UK Weather for Friday 03 June 2005.



An area of rain across central Scotland moved northeast during the night to become confined to the far northeast by daybreak. Mainly cloudy skies produced patchy rain or showers across parts of southwest Scotland, Northern Ireland, northwest England, the Pennines, Wales and southwest England. There were some clear spells across East Anglia and Lincolnshire but it turned hazy with mist patches. Thunderstorms with locally heavy rain readily developed across parts of Kent, East Sussex and Essex during the morning. Further showers developed over the UK during the day but many parts also enjoyed sunny spells. Showers became locally very heavy and merged to longer spells of rain as they moved northeast across England during the afternoon and evening. Thunderstorms with gusty winds were reported from the Midlands, Lincolnshire, northeast England, London and East Anglia.

The afternoon temperatures were near normal but it was warm in sheltered central and eastern parts of the UK.





Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 04 June 2005.

It was a cloudy night across the Northern Isles and north of Scotland with mist and patchy drizzle. Elsewhere in Scotland, there was variable cloud but also showers. Frequent showers affecting Northern Ireland pushed east through the night, across southern Scotland and northern England. Showers also affected Wales and southwest England, with some pushing eastwards but elsewhere it was largely dry with clear spells.

An unsettled day followed with showers developing and streaming eastwards. They were frequent across Scotland and northern England, merging to give more persistent and locally heavy rain across the southern Highlands, central belt, Borders and Northumberland. Elsewhere the showers became more isolated during the afternoon and there was sunshine between them. The Channel Islands and far south were particularly

favoured with sunshine but it was also breezy. Lingering showers petered out during the evening.

It was rather cool across the Northern Isles and in areas open to the west-to- southwest wind such as west Wales, the West Country and parts of the Channel coast. Elsewhere temperatures were close to normal or on the warm side.

Summary of UK Weather for Sunday 05 June 2005.

Generally a rather cloudy night with a few showers. The showers were most frequent across western and southern Scotland, northern England, north Wales and the north Midlands. However, some more persistent rain spread northeast across the West Country, eventually reaching the fringes of south Wales.

Through the day showers continued to affect Scotland and the northern half of England with a more organised line extending from Skye to Norfolk. The rain in the southwest also continued to edge northeast but progress was slow with the rain largely confined south of a line from Harlech to Dungeness and also fragmenting. Elsewhere it was largely dry and although there were some bright or sunny spells. Shetland enjoyed some lengthy sunny periods.

During the evening, patchy rain continued to affect south Wales and the more southern counties of England but elsewhere shower activity began to diminish.

It was rather cool across the Northern Isles, northern and eastern Scotland and eastern fringes of England. It was also rather cool across western Cornwall but elsewhere temperatures were close to normal.




Summary of UK Weather for Monday 06 June 2005.

Outbreaks of rain over parts of south Wales, southern England (locally heavy in the southwest) and East Anglia moved southeast overnight and much of East Anglia and south Wales had become dry soon after dawn. Showers affected northeast Scotland, but elsewhere it was dry with clear intervals.

During the morning the rain in the south continued its progress southwards, clearing all but parts of Devon and Cornwall by midday. Showers affected the northern isles but elsewhere the weather was dry and in northern parts of the UK it was fairly sunny. Outbreaks of rain continued for much of the afternoon across parts of southwest England but the last vestiges eventually died out as sunnier skies across Scotland sank south across much of northern England; further south it remained rather cloudy, but skies tended to clear there during the evening. The showers in the far north also faded away.

Temperatures were in the rather cool category near North Sea coasts and in cloudier parts of the south but they were near normal elsewhere, although parts of Northern Ireland were very warm.

Summary of UK Weather for Tuesday 07 June 2005.

Overnight there were slight showers across Shetland but elsewhere it was dry, and with extensive clear periods it turned out to be a cold night with an air frost as far south as Oxfordshire. Fleeting mist patches formed but these dispersed quickly after sunrise.

During the morning England, Wales and Scotland had sunny periods, but high cloud turned the sunshine hazy at times. Northern Ireland was bright due to thicker cloud across the region, and this more extensive cloud drifted north bringing drizzle to parts of the Outer Hebrides by midday. The rain and drizzle spread to other parts of the Hebrides and the far west and northwest of mainland Scotland during the afternoon, and the cloud extended across much of Scotland, but elsewhere the weather remained settled with plenty of sunshine across England and Wales. Patchy rain affected the far west of Northern Ireland and western Scotland during the evening, but elsewhere there was little change.

Temperatures were in the warm or very warm category across Northern Ireland and parts of eastern Scotland, and mostly near normal elsewhere.

Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 08 June 2005.

Most of England, Wales and southern Scotland were dry and clear/sunny throughout with light winds. Inland areas became chilly in the night-time period with most minima around 5 °C but lower in some places (Redhill Airfield fell to 0.6 °C). Long spells of sunshine were the norm with most places having over 13 hrs sunshine in the 24-hr period to 6 p.m., and temperatures rose to above average generally with many places reaching 21 °C but northern England was the warmest area: Church Fenton 22.7 °C, Rotherham 23.4 °C and Manchester Hulme 22.4 °C). Coastal parts, though not as chilly in the night-time period as inland, stayed relatively cool by afternoon as sea-breezes set in around most coasts with many places struggling to reach 15 °C despite the sunshine. Clacton in Essex had a maximum of only 12.4 °C.

Northern Ireland had similar weather to England and Wales except that it clouded over in the afternoon. However, much of Scotland, especially the north and west, was mostly cloudy and there was a little rain or drizzle in places and also some very misty weather around the Islands and the west coast. (Lerwick had 3.5 mm of rain).

Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 09 June 2005.

Overnight, England and Wales were mostly clear and dry with just patchy cloud, this mainly over Lincolnshire, East Anglia, NW Wales and around Cumbria. In these clearer skies in the south temperatures fell to around 6 °C generally but Redhill had a minima of 0.9 °C. Scotland and N. Ireland were largely cloudy and mild overnight with a few spots of rain in places.

During the day, the cloud over Scotland broke up in many places, especially away from coasts, giving some periods of warm sunshine (this setting off the odd shower over the Highlands (Loch Glascarnoch 3.0 mm). Conversely, after a sunny and warm morning, cloud bubbled up and spread out over much of northern and central parts of England and Wales, moving into southern England during the afternoon. However, many places in the far south and southwest stayed sunny and warm (Newquay 15.3 hr in 24 hrs to 5 p.m.). A few showers were around by evening over east Suffolk but the cloud started to break up late in the period.

Temperatures were mostly on the warm side of normal. The London area was warmest (Central London and Heathrow 22.9 °C, St James Park 23.2 °C), but Inverbervie (Aberdeenshire) also reached 22.9 °C. Winds were light and variable.


Summary of UK Weather for Friday 10 June 2005.

Most of the UK had a dry night although there were isolated light showers in parts of eastern England and in the far north of Scotland and the Northern Isles. Clear skies in parts of Scotland led to a touch of ground frost in places.

During the day, most of England and Wales saw some bright or sunny spells. East Anglia was more cloudy with some light showers and there were a few isolated light showers in other areas but most places were dry. Northern Ireland was dry and largely sunny. Scotland had variable amounts of cloud. Most places saw some sunshine but the far northwest tended to be more cloudy.

By evening the isolated showers over England and Wales were confined to the southwest. Elsewhere it became dry and largely clear. Northern Ireland was dry with clear spells. Scotland was largely dry but it became mostly cloudy and isolated showers developed in places.

Temperatures were mostly near normal but it was warm in parts of southwest England and rather cool on the east coast of England.




Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 11 June 2005.

Most of the UK had a dry night with mainly cloudy skies. Thicker areas of cloud produced patchy slight rain or showers over north and northeast Scotland and the Outer Hebrides. A small area of slight rain over northeast England drifted slowly southeast to reach Lincolnshire by the end of the night. There were some clear spells over Northern Ireland, southwest Scotland and notably East Anglia and southeast England where ground frosts were recorded.

Many parts of the UK had a dry day. Most places were rather cloudy but there were some bright or sunny spells, especially along parts of the south coast, the Channel Islands, north Wales, Northern Ireland and southwest Scotland. Patchy slight rain over Lincolnshire and Norfolk petered out during the morning. Thicker patches of cloud produced a little rain or showers at times across other parts of the UK.




Summary of UK Weather for Sunday 12 June 2005.

Showery rain across northern and eastern Scotland pushed southwest overnight with some heavier bursts across the northwest Highlands and Southern Uplands. Patchy rain also brushed across northern and eastern England with the odd pocket of light rain across Northern Ireland. Across the rest of the country it was largely dry.

During the day the showery rain extended further south into north Midlands and northern fringes of East Anglia. Drier weather followed across northern Scotland but a further area of rain spread across these parts later. For Northern Ireland, Wales and the rest of England, with the exception of the odd light shower, it was generally dry with variable cloud. There were good sunny periods across southern England.

During the evening the rain across northern Scotland edged southwards across the Highlands. At the same time, the showery rain across southern Scotland and northern England began to peter out leaving a heavier pulse across Norfolk clearing eastwards.

Temperatures were close to normal across southern England but generally it was rather cool, and it was cool, locally very cool across parts of eastern Scotland and northeast England.




Summary of UK Weather for Monday 13 June 2005.

Rain initially affected much of Scotland north of the central belt with some heavy rain across the Highlands. During the night, although fragmenting, the rain push south and west across the rest of Scotland and across northern England. There was also an area of rain across East Anglia but this cleared eastwards during the early hours. For Northern Ireland, Wales and the rest of England it was a dry night. Cloud cover varied with largely clear skies across south Wales, central and southern England.

During the day the rain in the north continued to push south and west, as a weakening feature, across Northern Ireland and as far south as north Wales and the north Midlands. There were further fragments of rain across Scotland and northern England but some brighter breaks developed, particularly across the Northern Isles. Cloud developed ahead of the rain across Wales, the Midlands and East Anglia but it remained fairly sunny across southern counties of England.

It was cool or very cool across Northern Ireland, eastern Scotland, northern and eastern England but elsewhere temperatures were generally close to normal.

Summary of UK Weather for Tuesday 14 June 2005.

There were clear spells across Northwest Scotland and Southern England overnight, allowing temperatures to fall low enough for a local grass frost. On the whole though it was mostly cloudy across the UK, with splashes of rain initially affecting parts of Northern Ireland, Northern England and Southern and Eastern parts of Scotland. However towards dawn, the rain became heavier and more persistent over Northern Ireland and into Northwest England. It remained wet here during the morning, with the rain more showery further north and east. Into the afternoon though this more persistent rain edged slowly north and east across parts of Scotland, especially heavy in the west, whilst Northern Ireland and Northern England became drier though remaining rather cloudy. For Wales and remaining parts of England, it was a mostly dry day with variable, often large amounts of cloud, with the south coast enjoying the best of the sunshine. Later, cloud amounts decreased somewhat in the south, whilst outbreaks of rain continued over Scotland. Winds were mostly southwesterly, locally fresh. Temperatures were locally cool over Northern Ireland, otherwise mostly near normal.



Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 15 June 2005.

It was mostly cloudy across the UK overnight, with rain initially affecting Central and Northern parts of Scotland. However further rain was already nudging into Cornwall and during the night this extended north and east as far as Northern Ireland, Liverpool Bay and down into Central Southern England, with some heavier bursts mixed in. Brisk southerly winds also accompanied the rain. To the north the rain across Scotland edged northwards but it was soon replaced during the morning by that moving out of Northern Ireland, giving quite a wet day in places. Across England and Wales the rain also cleared north and east from most parts by early afternoon. Following the rain it was a drier and brighter afternoon for many with some sunny spells developing, but a few clumps of heavy showers developed over parts of Southern England. These drifted northeast in the breeze, with some thunder reported across Bedfordshire and later over East Anglia. After dark, many parts became dry staying rather cloudy. Winds were mostly south or southwesterly, occasionally fresh to strong. Highs were mostly around average.







Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 16 June 2005.

Rain spread across Northern Ireland overnight and there was some heavy rain over the Northern Isles at first. Most of Scotland was dry but there was some lighter rain in the south, as well as across parts of northern England. The bulk of England and Wales was mostly cloudy and over the southwest there was drizzle.

Cloudy skies persisted overnight across Northern Ireland and there were some outbreaks of rain and drizzle. Thicker cloud also gave some rain over southern Scotland, but the north and northeast stayed dry with variable cloud. Much of England and Wales had a cloudy night and there was some fog and drizzle along southern and western coasts and in the Channel Islands.




Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 18 June 2005.

It was a cloudy night across the Northern Isles with outbreaks of rain and it was rather cloudy across the rest of Scotland with the odd pocket of drizzle. For Northern Ireland, northern England, Wales and the West Country it was a dry but rather cloudy night. Across the rest of England, skies were largely clear but some mist and fog developed.

Summary of UK Weather for Sunday 19 June 2005.

Initially heavy rain affected Northern Ireland and western Scotland; locally thundery, it extended northeastwards during the night. Later in the night the rain cleared Northern Ireland and degenerated into showers across Scotland. For England and Wales it was a dry night with long clear periods although cloud developed across Wales and northwest England.

By the early hours of the morning the thunderstorms that had caused flash floods across northeast England had moved away into the North Sea. The UK then had a largely dry and, for many, fresher night. However, it remained warm and humid across East Anglia and the southeast. Clear spells lead to patchy mist, fog and low cloud, particularly across northern England. The daytime was fine and bright for much of the country. The best of the sunshine occurred across southern Scotland, Wales and across England away from the southeast quadrant. In the southeast, though, there was more cloud and during the morning thunderstorms developed across the London area. These thunderstorms drifted northeast across East Anglia and deposited 15.6 mm of rain in just 2 hours at Coltishall near Norwich before clearing away over the North Sea. Central and northern Scotland together with Northern Ireland also saw more cloud, and outbreaks of light showery rain slowly moved in off the Atlantic during the day. Summary of UK Weather for Tuesday 21 June 2005.

Scotland and N. Ireland were cloudy with periods of rain overnight, most of the heavier rain falling over western Scotland (Sloy 19.0 mm). This cloud and rain (associated with a cold front) moved east and south into northern England and north Wales by mid-morning but weakening and breaking up as it did so, leaving behind a largely dry scenario over Scotland and N. Ireland with plenty of sunshine and just a few showers. By early afternoon the front became very weak, giving just patchy cloud over the Midlands and southern England in the afternoon and evening. So, most of the country had good spells of sunshine and was generally dry by mid-afternoon. The best of the sunshine was in the south (Newquay 13.6 hrs) whilst the Southeast was warmest with many places having maxima over 24 °C (Gravesend 26.2 °C, East Malling 26.4 °C). Indeed, temperatures were warm or very warm over most of the UK with largely light winds. During the afternoon it clouded over again in Northern Ireland with some patchy light rain at times by evening, this reaching western Scotland later, but the rest of the UK had a fine, warm evening.

Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 22 June 2005.

Overnight there was persistent rain across much of Northern Ireland and Scotland, heaviest in the west and especially the Outer Hebrides. The odd spot affected the far north of England but elsewhere the weather was dry with clear spells and patchy mist.

During the morning the rain across northern parts of the UK edged away to the northeast with all but northwest Scotland becoming dry by midday. Overnight there were outbreaks of rain across parts of Scotland and Northern Ireland, heavy at times across the west of the former, but elsewhere the weather was mainly dry with clear periods and patchy mist.

Scotland and Northern Ireland had a mostly cloudy night with rain in places, although much of central and northern Scotland remained dry. There were some thunderstorms over the southwest of England, central southern England and south Wales. Thundery activity extended to the Midlands by 0600 and some rain reached northwest England.


Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 30 June 2005.

Northern Ireland had some fog overnight and low cloud and drizzle affected northeast Scotland. Much of Scotland was dry.
