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INTRODUCTORY AND EXPLANATORY.

To a periodical which has been published monthly during thirty years, and honoured by communications from nearly all the leaders in Meteorological work, a General Index is an obvious necessity.

I have, therefore, prepared the following pages, respecting which I desire to offer a few explanatory remarks.

It may be well, in the first place, to mention a curious error, and how it has been dealt with. In volume XXI. (1886) there was a mistake in numbering the pages, 141 to 144 were used twice; in this Index the second four pages are referred to as 141A, 142A, 143A, and 144A.

As the chief points aimed at have been utility and conciseness, cross references have been largely employed, so that those who use the Index will almost always find what they need, or else a reference to it, under the first word for which they look. Some subjects have, however, so many entries that they have necessitated much thought, and it would be presumptuous to assume that the best plan has been adopted,—although it is hoped that that is the case. Perhaps the least satisfactory entries are those under the general heading of *Meteorology at* and *Rainfall at*—the latter is generally included in the former, but not always, and those who wish to be quite sure that they have all the information respecting any given place, will do well to consult both lists. Moreover there is the further difficulty that, for example, the Cape of Good Hope is in Africa, and it would be well not merely to look for the *Cape*, but also to turn up the entries under *Africa*.

Of course entries such as *Climatological Table*, *Supplementary Table*, *Meteorological Notes on the Month*, which occur in every

number, are not indexed—they would give about 1,000 additional entries, and would convey no information beyond that given in the following little table, which may be useful—it gives the year of which the rainfall, temperature, &c., are published in the respective volumes.

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Part II., at the close of the Subject Index, is a list of books reviewed in the thirty volumes—about 400 works—embracing a considerable proportion of the meteorological literature of the last quarter of a century,—a small bibliography, which, I trust, will be of some use, even independently of the *Meteorological Magazine*.

That the Index is perfect, it is vain to hope; but one of my valued meteorological friends, the Rev. T. A. Preston, has helped me greatly, having type-written the whole, and I have, perhaps, spent too many hours over it myself; but it is the summing up of one portion of my life's work, and I should be ashamed to allow it to be quite unworthy of the correspondents who have made the *Meteorological Magazine* what it is.
