
SIGNIFICANT WEATHER



Summary of UK Weather for Thursday 01 January 2015.
 Patchy rain and drizzle continued to affect western areas of England and Wales throughout the night, while rain over western Scotland became more persistent and locally heavy at times.
 Elsewhere it was a mainly dry night with steadily increasing amounts of cloud. Winds also increased across the whole of the U.K. throughout the night, becoming strong along many western coasts.
 It was a much milder night than previous nights, generally above average for the time of year.



Outbreaks of rain across the north-west moved steadily south-eastwards throughout the day. This rain was heavy in places, especially across western hills.
 Ahead of this, it remained largely dry, but cloudy, with some patchy drizzle in the west. The rain reached south-eastern parts through the evening, with clearer, showery conditions having moved into the north-west.
 It was a windy day for all, especially across northern and central parts where there were gale, locally severe, force gusts. Gale force gusts were also recorded in coastal areas further south.

It was an exceptionally mild day, with temperatures well above average for the time of year.






Conditions became less windy through the early hours, and the blustery showers eased too, leaving a largely dry picture by dawn with clear spells. Temperatures fell to low single figures Celsius across northern areas. During the day it was much less windy than recently, and many areas had mostly dry and fairly sunny weather, especially central and eastern parts of the U.K. There was a scattering of showers in many western areas and across Scotland, however, these were generally light. During the evening a band of rain spread across south-western England and Wales, and this quickly spread north-east across most areas by midnight. Strong winds and gales accompanied the rain, with the strongest gusts around exposed southern and western coasts. Temperatures were close to or slightly above average for early January, with the warmest parts of the country in south-west England.</p>

Summary of UK Weather for Saturday 03 January 2015.

Much of the U.K. started dry, although wintry showers continued across northern parts, with hill snow. It was also very windy in the far north at first, although winds soon eased.

A band of cloud and rain also spread in from the west across much of Northern Ireland, Wales and all except the far north of England by dawn. This rain turned temporarily to snow across some of the high ground in Wales, whilst across the far south-west it also turned windy by dawn.


With milder air spreading in it was a very mild start across the far south-west, however there was a marked temperature gradient across central Wales and England, with much cooler conditions across the rest of the country.

The rain through the morning fell as sleet and wet snow for a time across parts of Wales, the Midlands and northern England.

During the afternoon, the rain gradually edged away eastwards, though not clearing some southern counties until around dusk. A few wintry showers affected parts of northern Scotland.

However, through the evening it became dry across pretty much the whole of the U.K., with clear skies quite widely, though the far south-west of England held on to the cloud and the milder air.

Elsewhere, temperatures fell quickly after dark.

Summary of UK Weather for Sunday 04 January 2015.

It was dry through the night for most of the U.K., with just a few showers continuing to affect the far north of Scotland.

Thicker cloud persisted across the south-west of England and the south of Wales, which kept temperatures there rather mild. The rest of the country saw clear spells persist, which allowed a widespread frost to develop, along with some locally dense fog patches, especially over central and south-eastern parts of England, Wales and Northern Ireland.


Through the morning, the freezing fog and low cloud across some central, eastern and southern areas was rather stubborn, for some not clearing all day.

Meanwhile, cloud thickened from the south-west, with the best of the afternoon sunshine towards the east of the country.

It was a cold day, especially where the cloud persisted, with temperatures widely below average for the time of year.

The exception was in the far north-west of Scotland, and far south-west of England, where it was milder.

Through the evening, many places that had fog in the morning, where it either cleared or lifted into low cloud, went back into fog quite readily.

Through the early hours many parts of central and eastern England had patches of fog or mist. With clear spells in the north-east of England temperatures fell, with a frost in places. However, it was cloudy and mild across much of the south-west U.K., and as the night progressed these milder conditions gradually spread north-eastwards. This helped to clear the mist and fog, but a lot of low cloud remained. Scotland and Northern Ireland had brisk winds, and it was rather cloudy, especially in the west, and it was wet across Shetland. Through the day, it remained largely cloudy, with the best of the bright and sunny spells across the north-east, and areas to the lee of hills, such as the Welsh borders. It was breezy for many, and quite windy across the far north-west. There was some patchy rain, mainly across western areas, but for most it was a dry day. Maximum temperatures were around or above average, and the mildest places were across north-western Scotland.</p>

		<p>It was largely cloudy during the early hours, with some patchy light rain across western parts of the U.K. However, a brief clearer spell of weather in the west allowed temperatures to dip and patchy fog to form.</p> <p>A band of rain, heavy at times, then moved across parts of Northern Ireland, western Scotland, Wales and south-west England towards dawn, with a little sleet and snow in the far north.</p> <p>Clearer, colder weather reached Northern Ireland and the far west of Scotland by morning, with scattered showers.</p> <p>Through the morning, the band of rain continued to push eastwards, reaching the south-east around midday, before clearing into the North Sea by mid-afternoon. This left a fine winters day across the country, with plenty of sunshine.</p> <p>However, there were a few showers in the west, these were most frequent in the north-west, where they fell as snow over the hills. There were storm to hurricane force gusts recorded widely, with Stornoway Airport recording a 98 knot gust. Showers, locally heavy and wintry, followed across Scotland towards dawn. There was also some low cloud and patchy light drizzle across southern England towards dawn. Overnight temperatures were close to or just above average for the time of year. The stormy conditions across Scotland gradually receded from the north coast, with generally dry and brighter conditions developing for a brief time across the country, with winds easing. However, outbreaks of rain and a strengthening wind spread from the west during the afternoon. Rain became persistent across western upslopes, especially across Cumbria. Cloud spread across Northern Ireland and western Scotland ahead of rain, which arrived in Northern Ireland by morning. This very slowly edged south and east through the day, and gradually turned more patchy in nature. By evening the rain affected much of northern England, Wales and south-west England. Although it was mostly light there were some heavy bursts at times, particularly in south-west Scotland. Ahead of the rain, much of England and Wales enjoyed a mostly dry day with some bright or sunny spells, although scattered showers affected some southern counties. Behind the band of rain it turned colder, meaning that showers turned increasingly wintry in nature, especially over hills and mountains. During the morning there was also isolated thunder associated with the showers.


The best of the drier conditions remained across southern and eastern parts of the U.K.

		<p>A rapidly deepening low pressure system moved north-eastwards close to north-west Scotland overnight, with its associated rain bearing cold front pushing south-eastwards to lie across northern England and Wales by 0600 UTC.</p> <p>Very strong winds affected much of Scotland, northern England and Wales, with some strong gusts further south too.</p> <p>The best of the drier weather was across southern England, although even here there was patchy light rain.</p> <p>It was a mild night for many, but colder conditions developed behind the cold front across north-west Scotland, with heavy and wintry showers too, and with some lightning in places.</p> <p>Through the day, the outbreaks of rain continued to move southwards to lie across southern parts by evening. The rain was heavy at times, with some large accumulations.</p> <p>Further north, the very strong winds continued, with a peak gust of 78 knots recorded at Sella Ness, Shetland at 1400 UTC.</p> <p>Wintry, locally thundery, showers continued to push into north-western parts, whilst it remained milder in the south.</p>

Cloud, outbreaks of rain, locally heavy, and milder temperatures across southern parts of England and Wales overnight became confined to south-east England by dawn. Clearer and colder conditions spread into the far south-west of England and Wales.</p> <p>It was a largely dry night across northern England, bar the odd isolated shower later in the night. However, across Northern Ireland and, in particular, Scotland there were plenty of wintry, locally thundery showers, with snow falling to increasingly low levels away from the coast by dawn.</p> <p>With temperatures falling towards, or below zero in the clearer spells between the showers, icy stretches formed in places.</p> <p>The early rain across south-east England cleared through the course of the morning, with the colder showery conditions following.</p> <p>The whole of the U.K. then had a day of sunshine and wintry showers. It was breezy across all areas, with localised gale force gusts along western coasts. The showers became increasingly wintry throughout the day, widely falling as snow above 100m, and snow being reported across the south-west of England by evening. The showers were heavy at times with thunder in the west. A tornado was reported in the Harrow area of London, causing damage to property.</p> <p>The snow showers continued into the evening, most frequent in the north and west, with accumulations to low levels at times.</p> <p>It was mild in the south-east under the rain at first, but colder conditions soon spread to all areas.</p>

0600 GMT 14 JANUARY 2015 SIG WEATHER	1200 GMT 14 JANUARY 2015 SIG WEATHER	<p>Summary of UK Weather for Wednesday 14 January 2015. It was a breezy day across the U.K., with a cold start for all areas. Showers continued through the night, mainly in the north and west. These were wintry with localised thunder, and with a tornado reported in west Cornwall.</p> <p>The showers brought snow to areas above 100m, and locally to lower levels. Over 30cm accumulated over the Highlands of Scotland and 9cm over the Cambrian Mountains of Wales.</p> <p>Showers eased through the morning, with many areas becoming fine for a time with easing winds.</p> <p>However, wind and cloud increased from the west through the afternoon, with persistent and heavy rain, accompanied by gale to severe gale force winds arriving in the west through the evening and moving steadily eastwards. The strongest winds were over exposed western coastal areas and over the high ground, with Aberdaron in Wales recording a gust of 72 knots.</p> <p>The highest temperatures were recorded in south-west England.</p>

Eastern and south-eastern England remained mainly dry, and it was a cold night across the country.


The area of more organised showers across south-west England and southern Wales pushed eastwards across southern England through the morning, and gave some sleet, and even a dusting of snow over the higher ground.

Much of the country fell below freezing overnight, leading to a hard frost developing.



		<p>Frequent wintry showers arrived on the north-westerly wind overnight across northern and western parts of the U.K., falling as snow across northern England, Scotland and Northern Ireland, even to low levels. Further south the showers were a mixture of rain and sleet. There were significant accumulations of snow for some north-western parts. The showers were locally heavy and thundery too.</p> <p>The south-east of England remained generally dry, with only isolated showers arriving by dawn. The far south-west saw increasing amounts of cloud through the early hours, with outbreaks of rain becoming more frequent towards dawn.</p> <p>By day, snow showers in the north and west continued, with further significant accumulations in places. Some of the showers were heavy and thundery with hail. One band of showers became slow moving across Cheshire and surrounding areas.</p>
		<p>As the day progressed, the showers gradually became more confined to western coastal areas. The band that caused problems across Cheshire moved south-east across England, weakening as it did so, but giving some snow or sleet showers further south and east.</p> <p>It was a windy day, especially in the south-west.</p> <p>Temperatures were widely below average for the time of year.</p>







ANALYSIS VALID 0000 UTC FRI 30 JAN 2015

Overnight, there was a good deal of cloud across the U.K. Outbreaks of rain or drizzle continued across south-east England, southern parts of the Midlands, and into east Wales, where it fell as sleet or snow over the hills. A few wintry flurries affected north-eastern Scotland at times, though fairly few and far between. Otherwise, it was a mainly dry night with minimum temperatures widely below freezing. It was a much quieter day than recently, with a good deal of dry weather, but it was rather cloudy and cold. A band of rain moved from south-east England into the north Midlands, giving some heavy rain in Kent, Sussex and Essex, and a few outbreaks of sleet and snow across higher ground further north. A few snow showers fed into north-eastern Scotland through the day too. The best of the dry and bright weather was across the north-west of the country. It stayed mostly dry, cloudy and cold into the evening, with further showery outbreaks of rain continuing in the east, some wintry.</p>

These mainly fell as sleet, with the snow confined to high ground until the showers met colder air across southern England. This allowed for some snow showers and gave some accumulations.</p> <p>Scotland and Northern Ireland held onto some wintry showers, whilst northern England turned dry towards dawn. Under clear spells it was a cold night, but minimum temperatures were close to average for the time of year.</p> <p>The wintry showers continued to move south across southern England and Wales through the rest of the morning. This gave a covering of snow over the higher ground, and some snow reached lower levels in the east, too. By the afternoon the wintry showers became more confined to west Wales and south-west England, and also to south-east England.</p> <p>Further north it remained mainly dry with some sunshine, although frequent showers of sleet and snow continued across Northern Ireland and Scotland.</p> <p>Gusty winds across Scotland lead to blizzard conditions at times over the higher ground.</p> <p>Maximum temperatures were below average in most places.</p>
